CDC updates guidelines to prevent infections in health care personnel

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has released an <u>update</u> to its 1998 guidelines to prevent and control infection in the health care workplace, including special considerations associated with emergency response personnel and the Americans with Disabilities Act. Intended for health care leaders and staff who address workplace health and safety, the updated guidelines apply to a broader range of health care settings, including hospital-based, long-term care and outpatient settings. New topics include using performance measures to track and guide quality improvement initiatives to prevent and control infections.

Vaping-related lung injuries continue to climb

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has <u>updated</u> the number of people with confirmed or probable lung injuries associated with electronic cigarette use or vaping products to 1,888 in 49 states, the District of Columbia and the U.S. Virgin Islands, including 37 confirmed deaths. CDC and the Food and Drug Administration continue to investigate the cause of the illness. CDC recently issued <u>updated guidance</u> for clinicians caring for patients with vaping-associated lung injuries, and encourages providers to <u>report</u> possible cases to their state or local health department.

CMS steps up oversight of nursing home inspections

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services has <u>announced</u> changes to the State Performance Standards System for state survey agencies to ensure that nursing home inspections are timely and accurate. "This includes new performance measures and stricter monitoring to ensure inspections are done in a fair, accurate, and timely manner, ensuring patient safety, and ensuring that enforcement actions — like civil money penalties — are applied consistently," according to a recent <u>news release</u> by CMS. The change is part of a broader CMS plan <u>announced</u> in April to enhance nursing home oversight, enforcement, transparency and quality while reducing administrative burden.

New Report! Criteria for Selecting the Leading Health Indicators for Healthy People 2030

The health and well-being of all people and communities are essential to a thriving, equitable society. The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Office of the Assistant Secretary for Health has charged the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine to convene an ad hoc committee to assist in the development of Leading Health Indicators (LHIs) for Healthy People 2030. In its <u>first report</u>, the committee discusses the background materials relevant to the charge and makes recommendations regarding the criteria for selecting LHIs.

Joint Commission advisory reviews new maternal care standards

The Joint Commission has issued an <u>advisory</u> reviewing its new hospital accreditation standards for preventing maternal hemorrhage and severe hypertension/preeclampsia effective July 1, 2020. The advisory also reviews suggested strategies for preventing postpartum hemorrhage, such as obstetric safety bundles. Report recommends actions to address clinician burnout

Between one-third and one-half of U.S. clinicians experience burnout and addressing the epidemic requires systemic changes by health care organizations, educational institutions and all levels of government, says a new **report** from the National Academy of Medicine. The report recommends actions to promote positive work and learning environments; reduce administrative burden and make health information technology easier to use; reduce the stigma associated with seeking help; and address gaps in the research on clinician well-being. The National Academy of Medicine's Action Collaborative on Clinician Well-Being and Resilience requested the study. In May, the American Hospital Association's Physician Alliance released a **playbook** to help hospital and health system leaders address burnout in their organizations.

Report examines racial, ethnic differences in opioid overdoses


Opioid overdose death rates increased for nearly all racial and ethnic groups in metropolitan areas between 2015 and 2017, according to a new report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Black Americans experienced the largest absolute and percentage increases, with a 103% increase in overdose deaths in large cities and a 361% increase in overdoses involving synthetic opioids. Synthetic opioids were involved in nearly 60% of opioid-involved overdose deaths in 2017. "Culturally competent interventions are needed to target populations at risk; these interventions include increasing awareness about synthetic opioids in the drug supply and expanding evidence-based interventions, such as naloxone distribution and medication-assisted treatment," the authors said. In 2018, drug overdose deaths declined 5.1% to about 68,000, according to perliminary data released by the CDC in July.

Website helps Americans locate substance use disorder treatment

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration has launched <u>FindTreatment.gov</u>,a website to help Americans locate substance use disorder treatment services. Users can access information on more than 13,000 treatment facilities, including treatment options, payment and insurance information. "We know that finding access to the right provider, at the right time, can be essential to helping someone start on the road to recovery," said <u>Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar.</u>
